The awards continue to evolve and in 2014 they have been streamlined to five categories – the Horbury Hunt Commercial Award, the Horbury Hunt Residential Award, the Kevin Borland Masonry Award for Commercial and Residential, and the Roof Tile Excellence Award. We are very excited that Bruce Mackenzie AM has agreed to allow the Landscape Award to be named in his honour.

CAMERON BRUHN

Cameron Bruhn is the editorial director of Architecture Media, Australia's leading publisher for the architecture and design community. Prior to this appointment, Bruhn was the editor of Architecture Media publications *Artichoke* and *Landscape Architecture Australia*. He holds a Bachelor of Architecture from the University of Queensland and is undertaking a practice-based PhD at RMIT University.

In 2005, Durbach was appointed an adjunct professor at University of New South Wales, and has taught, lectured, exhibited, judged awards and been published both nationally and internationally. In 2008, Durbach co-curated the Australian Pavilion at the Venice Biennale of Architecture.

John Tuomey studied architecture at University College Dublin, where he is now inaugural Professor of Architectural Design. He has lectured at many schools in Europe and the US, and in 1988 he established his Dublin-based partnership with Sheila O'Donnell. O'Donnell + Tuomey has won the RIAI Gold Medal and the AAI Downes Medal. The practice has been shortlisted four times for the RIBA Stirling Prize and has exhibited at the Venice Biennale. Current work includes the Central European University in Budapest.

EMMA WILLIAMSON

Emma Williamson co-founded CODA Studio in 1997, and since then has been involved in all aspects of the practice, injecting her passion for architecture, interiors and product design into the studio. Over a ten-year period, Williamson combined practice and teaching as an academic at Curtin University in the Department of Architecture and Interior Architecture. SAW SWEE HOCK STUDENT CENTRE

Saw Swee Hock Student Centre

O'Donnell + Tuomey

The Saw Swee Hock Student Centre at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) is a lesson in expression through brick.


Irish-based architecture practice O'Donnell + Tuomey designed the seven-storey building and its striking red brick facade. The centre, at LSE's Aldwych campus, houses all of the university's student facilities and is a hub of student buzz. When beginning their design concepts for the centre, Sheila O'Donnell and John Tuomey from O'Donnell + Tuomey mapped the sight lines of the narrow streets around the campus. From this, they discovered the site's angular geometries, and this has informed the irregular, intertwined spatial design of the building.

"Like a Japanese puzzle, our design is carefully assembled to make one coherent volume from a complex set of interdependent component parts," says the architects.

Red brick was used for the walls. The walls angle inwards on the eastern side, allowing a recessed public entrance. In addition to the solid walls, brick has been used to give the building texture, arranged in a way to give a perforated effect.

"The perforated planes are constructed from a single leaf of brickwork with spaces in the flemish bond pattern to allow light to both infiltrate the interior spaces and filtrate out at night to create a pattern effect," says O'Donnell + Tuomey.

Horbury Hunt Commercial Award

UNSW Kensington Colleges

Bates Smart

The redevelopment of the Kensington Colleges at the University of New South Wales creates a vibrant student community of five colleges, which provide accommodation for more than 900 students. These new buildings integrate the existing Goldstein Hall to form a new campus precinct.

Arranged around a landscaped courtyard, the colleges feature faceted walls of glazed brickwork, presenting a playful expression of colour, texture, dappled light and shade. These facades use three bricks. A blend of sixty percent Dynasty Brushed Leather brick and thirty percent Karrington Silver brick is common across all of the colleges. The remaining ten percent comes from the Burlesque series, with a customized accent colour used in each college to reinforce its individuality.

The rectilinear external facades respond to the mid-century brickwork of the surrounding buildings by using a blend of three shades of face brick as a contemporary interpretation of the original clinker brick.

Dallas Brooks Community Primary School

McBride Charles Ryan

Dallas Brooks Community Primary School is an amalgamation of three local primary schools in Dallas, Broadmeadows, in Melbourne's north. It is part of a number of public school developments in the area collectively referred to as the Broadmeadows Regeneration Project.

The school acts as a walled city, a metaphor that has relevance with many of the suburb's new ethnic groups. The ebullient brickwork patterning of the outer wall recalls the rich patterning of the traditional dress of some of these groups.

The profile of the wall was developed by compressing the silhouetted imagery of the surrounding suburban fabric into this new composition. These strategies were an attempt to produce a new and inclusive architecture for this unique Melbourne community.

The striated brick facade of the Dallas Brooks Community Primary School physically and metaphorically weaves the project into its diverse community.

Dr HJ Foley Rest Park is located on a busy corner in Glebe, New South Wales. The new amenities building has been designed in conjunction with the City of Sydney design team.


Dark blue masonry was chosen for its durability and robustness and in response to the brick buildings surrounding the site. Low-profile bricks were selected to complement the small scale of the project. The bricks were laid in a stack bond pattern to accentuate the building's rectilinear form.

The design team has subverted the traditional idea of the brick public toilet by floating the masonry walls above the ground plane by fifty millimetres. This creates a shadow line and aids ventilation and maintenance.

The resolute form of Foley Park Amenities is simultaneously hard-edged and deeply practical, making it an engaging piece of public architecture.

Firbank Grammar Learning Hub

ARM Architecture

The design for the Firbank Grammar Learning Hub in bayside Melbourne was generated by the desire to associate the new structure with the origin of the campus – the brick federation style house, Wool Wool. The decision to work in brick allowed the architecture team to connect the new to the original, and tap into the long and complicated tradition of brick construction in modernist architecture. Working from the examples of 1920s German brick architecture and the buildings of Jozef Plecnik, the materiality is presented differently yet simultaneously familiar.

This approach resulted in a building composed of elements and ideas that respond to the complex internal relationships of the campus and its surrounds. The building consisted of distinct design strategies for the facades and the adjacent external areas. The brick facade to the south and the turned brick columns respond to Wool Wool, while the battening to the northern facade references the original residential architecture of the surrounding suburbs. A playful feature wall presents a contemporary image to the north of the site. The intent was to challenge the students thinking by creating a rich and stimulating environment within a great urban campus.

North Melbourne Townhouses

Freadman White Architects

This four-storey townhouse project in Melbourne allows for both residential and commercial functions in the same space. The average footprint for each townhouse is just forty-nine square metres. The ground-floor zones, which are referred to as “flexible space,” extend the possibilities for living and working.

The site’s small footprint meant that each townhouse needed to borrow amenity from its surrounding context, to not only feel larger but to also enhance the benefits of what an inner-city site can offer. The rhythms of the punctuating outdoor courtyards bring light into tall, narrow voids and opportunities to accentuate the vertical dimension are favoured.

The project’s external material palette takes its cues from the nearby industrial warehouses – beauty found in the direct and honest material of brick. Through solid form, framed views are offered to nearby landmarks such as the North Melbourne Town Hall Clock Tower.

The brick facade of the North Melbourne Townhouses is carved and modeled to great effect, carefully engaging the building with its context.

Aperture House

Cox Rayner + Twofold Studio


This narrow lot project in inner Brisbane extends a small worker's cottage by using a roof geometry that is the inverse of the existing gable. The aim was to optimize north and south light penetration, while dramatizing the new spaces and accentuating their surfaces.

The architecture explores brickwork's capacity to be modelled, inspired by footing walls of the existing cottage. The brickwork is perforated and patterned to create varied depths of field, which belie the modest scale of the spaces. The brickwork also forms niches, plinths and floor surfaces and these features give the effect of the garden terraces folding up into the house. Operable louvres and sliding doors enable this material to open and close spaces in response to climate or to modify spatial scale and atmosphere.

The house is simultaneously about manipulating perspective and the intimacy of experience generated by craftsmanship, the latter owing much to a bricklaying couple specializing in the art. The architecture equally accentuates the potentials of long, narrow urban sites to be sequenced into richly diverse living experiences.

WINNER

This humble worker's cottage has been deftly extended. This is a home that celebrates the beauty of daily life. A series of finely crafted brick elements creates spaces, edges and openings that are adaptable and atmospheric.

Fairbairn Rd

Inglis Architects

A simple architectural language of masonry, timber and stone was enlisted for this house in Melbourne. The materials are exposed for what they are, chosen for their unique character and pushed to their physical extents.

The architects placed great emphasis on the front facade due to the house being infill. It was their ambition that the house engaged with its environment and the individual. To do this, the architects implemented a key strategy that involved layering the front elevation to the street to create depth. The breezeway brick screen is a key device and creates these necessary layers. It serves multiple purposes, the first being a strong idea of entry by creating a secondary landscaped space that gives the property a sense of intimacy. The second purpose was to create a permanent privacy screen for the master bedroom that is situated at the front of the house so that it could engage with the adjacent park.

Materials were chosen based on their character and their ability to show their craft. Brick allowed the architect to do this and highlight the handmade quality of the building while being functional. These strong ideas of materiality are woven through the exterior and interior.

This petite home has a delightful street presence. Its brick screen creates a delicate foil between built form and landscape.

Jewel House

Karen Abernethy Architects

The architects behind this project believe that when altering an existing structure, any change or addition should respect and give praise in a contemporary way to its original form and context.

For this project – an addition to a single-fronted Victorian terrace house – the original salvaged materials have been re-used wherever possible. Red bricks, including rounded brick corners and bird’s mouth details, were collected during demolition and re-appropriated as the external skin for the new, elegant, triangulated form.

The rounded bricks and bird’s mouth apex details were incorporated into the facade and a brick lattice screen was built at the upper level, which in part shades the west-facing glass and creates a beautiful dance of light and shadow inside the house during the afternoon.

Existing internal solid, brick walls were stripped of hard plaster, bagged and painted, exposing the brick texture and original details such as recessed joist ends and lintels.


The use and re-use of brick at the Jewel House is a labour of love. The outcome celebrates brick’s ability to be creatively recycled.



Skylight House

Andrew Burges Architects

Located in a neighbourhood of Federation houses and California bungalows in Sydney's North Shore, this residential project has gone from a badly planned existing dwelling to a functional family home, with improved natural light and greater connection to the garden.

The design concept for the house came from the interplay between an abstract, white, sculptured ceiling line with skylights, and the textured walls and floors. These walls and floors have robust natural finishes, including recycled face brick re-used from the existing house's demolished walls, in combination with additional supplies from The Brick Pit. Through this interplay, the project combines compactness in plan with spatial and material generosity in section.

The detailing of the bricks has been developed to capture a direct, "unfinished" quality, which heightens the contrast to the refined finishes of the joinery and ceiling. In the main bedroom a rough opening frames the view to the garden left finished as it was in the early phase of construction at the completion of the bricklaying.



Alexandra Street House


Robert Simeoni Architects

Alexandra Street House is a family home located in Melbourne's inner south. The building reads as a strong, abstract form articulated through a series of shifts and slippages, resulting in an introverted, cocoon-like dwelling. The bricks were selected for effect - the proportion and colour of this brick was sought to complement and accentuate the abstract form of the design.

The house is sited within an eclectic streetscape where brick is a predominant material. The use of this unique handmade brick adds to the existing broad spectrum of masonry types and colours in the area.


The project required a strong sense of collaboration between architect and builder, and direct liaison with the bricklayer was essential in establishing bespoke brick coursing, jointing and other adaptations to ensure a holistic composition and a harmonious reading of the brickwork. This collaboration helped to ensure the overall abstract composition was achieved.

The Concrete Masonry Association of Australia (CMAA) is the peak body that represents the concrete masonry manufacturers of Australia. This includes bricks, blocks, pavers and retaining walls.

The CMAA is an industry body and does not sell or supply any masonry products. The CMAA supports the concrete masonry industry by providing technical

information and advice to architects, engineers, specifiers and educators. The CMAA publishes technical manuals, data sheets and software packages relating to concrete block walling, concrete paving, permeable paving and concrete masonry retaining walls, which are free to download from the CMAA's website. The association also conducts workshop courses and provides a technical advisory service for masonry design queries.

Kevin Borland Masonry Award

Kevin Borland was born in West Melbourne on 28 October 1926. After deferring studies to serve in the West Pacific in World War II, Borland returned to Melbourne to undertake a Bachelor of Architecture at the University of Melbourne and graduated in 1950.

Borland's early projects showed his love of structural and formal innovation in architecture. After working at Mockridge Stahle & Mitchell Architects's office, Borland, together with friends Peter McIntyre and John and Phyllis Murphy, won the national competition to design the Melbourne swimming and diving stadium for the 1956 Summer Olympics.

In 1952, Borland designed the innovative Rice House at Eltham in Victoria, which features a series of linked thin concrete parabolic arches. His more conventional residential designs of the period show his early fondness for both Sydney architect Harry Seidler and Seidler's former Harvard professor Walter Gropius. These include Melbourne projects the Klepner House in East Brighton (1955), the Stein House in Glen Waverley (1956) and the Mollar House in Beaumaris (1959).

In 1954, he married Margaret Aitken. The couple had six daughters and one son.

In 1955, Borland commenced his lengthy architectural teaching career at the Melbourne Technical College. He was a popular design teacher in all three Victorian architecture schools over the next three decades.

Together with his former student and friend Daryl Jackson, Borland completed the design and construction of the distinguished "brutalist" Harold Holt Memorial Swimming Centre in Melbourne's Glen Iris in 1968 to 1969.

By the mid 1970s Borland, now a respected senior figure in Melbourne architecture, maintained an active practice. Significant projects from this period include the former Bram Residence in Merricks (1976), the Mount Eliza North Primary School (1977), the former Crossman Residence in East Malvern (1978), the former Roger Evans Residence in Queenscliff, Victoria (1983), the Borland Residence in Newport, Victoria (1989-90) and extensions to the former Klepner residence in Brighton East (1990). During this period Borland was appointed as Foundation Professor of Architecture at Deakin University (1981). In 1985 Borland accepted a two-year appointment as Director of Architecture at the Building Management Authority in Western Australia. Kevin Borland died in Melbourne in 2000, aged 74.

At a time when peer awards were far less frequent than today, Borland's designs received eleven awards from state chapters of the Royal Australian Institute of Architecture. For a decade after the death of Robin Boyd, Borland's designs, more than those of any other architect, shaped the trajectory of Melbourne architecture. As well as an innovative architect, he was a generous patron of younger architects and an inspiring and much-loved design studio teacher.

Clayfield House

Richards and Spence


Clayfield House is a large family home on a small site in Brisbane. External space is given the same priority as internal space. A hierarchy of volumes – big and small, high and low – are organized around a central courtyard that occupies the largest volume in the house. The courtyard provides a shared amenity of light, garden and sky, visible from most rooms in the house. Views across the courtyard facilitate privacy on the long, narrow site with close neighbours on three sides. The central double-height circulation nave, which crosses the courtyard, physically separates rooms and allows opportunities for daily interaction.

Parallel, double-height masonry walls extend the full length of the site from inside to outside. The colour and treatment of the blockwork appropriates a stone wall. Window joinery is concealed from view, fixed externally allowing the blockwork openings to remain pure and naked, like a ruin.

This house uses the benefits of thermal mass in a hot climate. Conventional brick veneer construction is reversed. External lightweight timber and metal cladding provides the requisite thermal cavity and satisfies a local town planning covenant for “timber and tin” construction. The external cavity protects the masonry from daily temperature fluctuations, maintaining a constant internal environment.

With some stunning houses surrounding this development, the architect has beautifully combined the contrasting colours and textures of split face blockwork with smooth steel and black timber facades, creating a striking, modern residential home that truly stands out from the rest.

Featuring the natural feel of raw stone, this contemporary home used quarter-height traditional split face concrete building blocks in the a steel colour to create a textured feel to the outdoor facade of the home and front fence exterior.

The highly articulated forms of this home engage it with the streetscape. Concrete block brings texture and warmth to the project.



The Curlewis House is organized around two courtyards, and sits within a large-scale rural, coastal landscape. The site looks over Corio Bay towards the You Yangs, the Melbourne CBD and the Geelong industrial waterfront.

The house responds to the scale of this landscape and the site's specific soil conditions. It is set back from the coastline and the street and sits behind and between existing trees. The building's floor levels step down with the fall in the site, and the building circulation links and crosses over the site pathways.

The building spaces and circulation link around and into two courtyard spaces. These are both "loose" courtyards that are connected to the surrounding landscape but act to mediate the scale of it. A series of thin internal and external spaces – some contained, some covered and some open – are discovered as you arrive and walk through the house.

The structural materials are used as finished surfaces; concrete block, hollow-core pre-cast concrete panels, and steel lintels. This materiality has a sense of solidity and protection but also allows spaces adjacent to courtyards to feel like porches or extensions of the courtyard space, allowing exterior spaces to come into the building.

The new Pyalong Police Station replaces the old station, which operated at the site since 1972, and includes an entrance foyer, reception counter, general office, meeting room, interview room and lock-up garage. The modern and environmentally sustainable station is a significant step up from the previous building, which was not designed as a police station. It also uses design features that will reduce both the station's impact on the environment and running costs.

Victoria Police has a long and proud history of local policing and officers understand and work closely with the country communities they serve. Ensuring there is a viable permanent police presence in the community will help deter criminal activity and build greater bonds between the station officer and the local residents into the future.

The concrete block facade of the Pyalong Police Station gives this community building a strong but approachable presence.




Located on the fringe of Melbourne's inner suburbs, this new family home sits in an established residential street of Victorian villas and Californian bungalows. When viewed from the footpath, Fairfield Hacienda and its angled roof fits into the landscape of single-level homes, effortlessly picking up the street's original pattern of hipped and gabled roof forms.

A closer look, however, reveals that this new house sits behind a sunny, walled courtyard. This room without a roof, except for a sheltering courtyard tree, is an extension of the living and dining spaces that open onto it. The enclosed courtyard is located to the north of the house and creates a buffer between the street and the house, allowing the living spaces to open up to and access northern light and warmth.

The courtyard of the Fairfield Hacienda takes the form of a ruin-like walled garden. Concrete block provides a relaxed backdrop to the space.

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

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



Bruce Mackenzie Landscape Award

Bruce Mackenzie AM

Born in 1932, Mackenzie studied art and design at the East Sydney Technical College in Darlinghurst. Mackenzie is known for his contribution to an emergence of an Australian consciousness that appreciates the indigenous environment. This concern for the true nature of Australia and its special qualities underlines a design ethos that he promotes and respects.

For nine years he served on the Council of the Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA) and chaired the Environment Committee for a further three years, assisting with the AILA's environment policies. He has lectured and presented to conferences extensively and is an enthusiastic writer and photographer, publishing many articles in professional journals. Projects of note include the Sydney Harbourside parks (Bruce Mackenzie & Associates), the Coogee Beachfront Master Plan

(Bruce Mackenzie & Associates), and the University of Technology Sydney Kuringai College at Lindfield (NSW Public Works Department and its project architect David Don Turner). Mackenzie developed a coastal parkland near Botany Bay in conjunction with the newly developed Port Botany Industrial Port. For the 2000 Summer Olympics in Sydney, Mackenzie provided a site-wide planting strategy that established an indigenous planting scheme for the 500-hectare site. He firmly believes that the indigenous environment is part of the way forward in terms of the threats of global warming.

In 2011 he wrote and published his fifty-year journey through landscape architecture, *Design With Landscape* (now available on iPad). Bruce was a founding member of the AILA and has been a state and national president. He was presented with the AILA Award in Landscape Architecture in 1986 and in June 1999 on the occasion of the Queens Birthday honours list, made a member of the Order of Australia (AM).

Devonport Surf Life Saving Club Precinct



Founded in 1927, the Devonport Surf Life Saving club was the first officially recognized surf club in Tasmania. Located at the iconic Mersey Bluff Plaza on Tasmania's North West coast, "The Bluff" as it is known by locals, is a popular spot for swimming, sunbathing and picnics.

Commencing in January 2011, the upgrade to the club house and surrounding facilities was welcomed by surf club members and the local community. The project included a number of family-friendly sites, including a new playground, barbecue facilities, a public plaza and car park.

In creating the versatile public area and walkway, 6,500 square metres of Adbri Masonry's Trihex and Quartz Stone pavers were used to bring to life the architects' vision of flowing waves, blending the ocean and beach environments.

In order to achieve the distinctive design, Adbri Masonry's Ulverstone plant produced the uniquely coloured Oatmeal, Salmon, Sandstone and Desert Sand pavers, which were installed in alternating layers to create the representation of flowing waves.

Wet N Wild Sydney

Site Image Landscape Architects

Opening in the summer of 2013, Wet N Wild Sydney is one of the world's most advanced waterparks.

Landscape architects Site Image, building contractors Lipman and paving contractor Sam The Paving Man were commissioned to develop all hard-surface pedestrian areas of the new fun park dubbed the "Beach Within Reach."

The \$115-million project encompasses an innovative landscape design with non-directional pavers, reducing visible straight lines, resulting in a stunning visual effect of tidelines around the park.

The developers wanted a paved area that resembled that of a natural beach landscape and mimicked tidal markings.

The universal pattern emulated the tidal wash lines of flotsam and jetsam seen on Sydney beaches after the tide has come and gone. Body paver colours transitioned at the "tidelines" in a random natural manner.



A defining feature of this designer residence is the striking, slimline rectangular pavers that have been treated with a honed surface texture, exposing the natural aggregate within the paver. Box Hill Gardens Multi-Purpose Area

Box Hill Gardens is a historical park, fourteen kilometres from Melbourne. ASPECT Studios and NMBW Architecture Studio were commissioned by Whitehorse City Council to create an innovative multi-purpose space within the well-loved Box Hill Gardens.

Three key concepts were behind the design:

1. Creation of a contemporary recreational and events surface, which functions as a flexible community space, providing courts for multiple sport and activities and areas for public events.
2. Part of the former tennis clubhouse has been retained and re-used as seating platforms, while recycled bricks from its demolition have been used for the walls and floor of a new amenities building and associated brick platforms and ledges. Brick is used as a mediating device between hard and soft landscape, tying diverse functional elements together through its repeated use.
3. Use of colour and graphics to encourage activity and to create a distinct surface that differentiates itself from the existing park character. A dynamic super graphic creates an iconic and playful destination.

The final design of the space successfully embodies a bold contemporary aesthetic with layers of history and memory, and the careful integration of landscape and built form elements.

The Box Hill Gardens Multi-Purpose Area simultaneously uses strong graphics and textural brick combinations to integrate use and form.

PHOOEY Architects enjoyed collaborating with Simon Ellis Landscape Architects to create a small, child-friendly rear garden filled with as many interesting and sustainable features as any large garden.

The project applies the surrealist technique of "Cubomania" to catalogue, re-use and re-invent the demolished building materials. This involved placing a grid over a plan of the old (largely paved) courtyard, which was entirely demolished. The cut squares were strategically re-arranged to suit the new functional layout.

This technique was also used for the adjoining architecture and the same grid was extended to inform the cladding of vertical/built garden elements. Embodied energy was minimized by balancing the quantity of demolished materials against those brought in to replace them.


The garden presents a bricolage of recycled face brickwork. Red clinkers were laid in modular grids with alternating perpendicular stretcher-bonds. The checkerboard pattern was strategically embellished with timber decking, exposed aggregate concrete, and water and sand features. Hardscapes were softened with planted strips to increase permeability.

Carefully considered spaces enable utilities, house a few service items, provide bicycle and general storage and facilitate outdoor cooking/entertainment, tranquillity and child play. The functional layout enables efficient circulation and offers flexible transition between inside and outside.


The landscape collage of this garden is a collaborative project that adroitly responds to the needs of children and is an exemplar of sustainable practice.



A House with Tiles on It



Flying in to Sydney, visitors often comment on the richly coloured tapestry of trees and terracotta roof tiles of the city's inner ring of suburbs. The traditional "Marseille" terracotta roof tile is one of the defining features of the Federation suburbs, a synthesis of engineering know-how and handcrafted traditional material. For this project, the architects were asked to re-imagine how a Federation house might work for a new family.

A new pavilion was proposed to house the new kitchen and dining space, and link the house back to its outdoor spaces. Being on a corner site, the new pavilion is visible from the street. Intended to act as a stitch in the streetscape, the new pavilion responds to the requirements of context using a familiar material, the humble roof tile.


The terracotta tile becomes the vehicle for a contemporary solution in a conservation context, which in time will develop a patina and depth of colour in perfect harmony with its surroundings.

The conceptual directness of this project belies its extraordinary sophistication. This is an innovative addition to a Federation house that respects the qualities of the neighbourhood and re-energizes the building for a new generation.



This high-end French provincial residence is of uncompromising quality and class, located in Melbourne's east. The home is delivered by the award-winning combination of master builder Brian Lee and architect Phillip Mannerheim.

Mannerheim says, "These curved roofs are a challenge to get just right, especially with the butt joint. This roof has pulled it off and is perfect. The tiles are very consistent and the workmanship is to the highest standard."

It is difficult to achieve a polished result when building a curved roof from a flat shingle but this project has achieved this successfully. The use of the Shingle tile demonstrates a smooth and refined look for the roof and is the clear standout feature in the design of this residence.

The striking curved roof of the Canterbury Residence speaks of technical know-how and the close collaboration between architect and builder.

The Shingle House

Clare Cousins Architects

This residential extension on a tight corner site was designed within the existing ground-floor footprint, with the first-floor programs nestled into the existing pitched roof. Clad with darkly coloured roof tiles, the first-floor addition plays on the existing terracotta roof's qualities with a series of delicate folds.

The extension, therefore becomes an extension of the roof as a way to minimize the visual bulk on a prominent corner. Cantilevered to form a sheltered ground-level entertaining area, the new insertion helps to create a link between inside and outside.

The application of a readily available roof tile in a non-traditional manner was a cost-effective, innovative and sustainable choice for this project. While the extension's generous cantilever rendered typical masonry prohibitive in cost due to the additional loads, roof tile shares the textural and low-maintenance properties of brick. Unlike brick, however, it can be applied to a lightweight frame, minimizing load and therefore the size and cost of structural members.

Junctions between the roof tiles and window reveal edges required innovative detailing, which was developed in collaboration with the builder. This unique rear facade is virtually maintenance-free.


Situated on Sydney's North Shore, Knox Grammar has long been regarded as one of the state's leading and most respected independent schools. The development of The Great Hall and Aquatic Centre embraces Knox's core values, traditions and its architectural heritage. Jones Sonter Architects describe the overriding architectural style as Scottish Baronial, a look that dates back to the fourteenth century.

One of the key structural and design elements that provides this link is the imposing roofline that covers the entire entrance foyer – an area more than 430 square metres, extending the full length of the building.

This roof, pitched at forty-four degrees, balances perfectly above the glass, brick and sandstone facade, providing a visual cue that links the past to the present.


